has just been published:

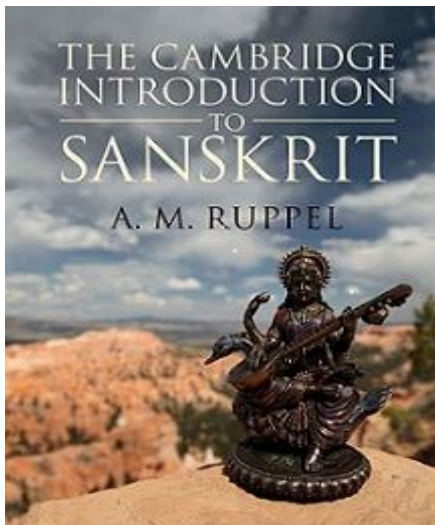
*The Cambridge Introduction

Sanskrit fever grips Germany

14 universities teaching India's ancient language struggle to meet demand as students clamour for courses. Will Germans be the eventual custodians of Sanskrit, its rich heritage and culture? If the demand for Sanskrit courses in Germany is any indication, that's what the future looks like.

Unable to cope with the flood of applications from around the world, the South Asia Institute, University of Heidelberg, had to start a Summer School in spoken Sanskrit in Switzerland, Italy and - believe it or not - India too.

In Germany, 14 of the top universities teach Sanskrit compared to just four in the UK. The University's Summer School spans a month in August every year and draws applications from across the globe.

So far, 254 students from 34 countries have participated in this course and every year many applications have to be rejected due to space.

Saturday is Sanskrit/Vedanta day

At present there are 20 adult students in the Saturday Class at St James School, London, all in their twenties and seventies and everything in between. Most of the students are of Hindu descent so they bring with them quite a lot of cultural background but are very receptive to new knowledge.

They are a hard-working and cheerful lot, so progress is good! Each week, on a Saturday morning, we fill three hours with a varied menu of tests, stories, paradigms, grammar and Vedantic metaphysics. And then, each week there is homework. In fact, last term, when I eased off on the paradigm learning as Christmas approached, I got lots of complaints!

We have decided to go for the IGCSE basic level (Option A) examination in early May as a staging post on the way to the higher level IGCSE.

In addition to this group, there is a smaller group which meets on Saturday evenings. These also are mainly of Hindu background, wishing to learn more of their own ancestral culture. They are mainly young professional people and we have been together long enough now to have become good friends, so our time together is a combination of study and pleasure. They too are aiming at the higher level (Option B) examination in 2018, so at some point the two groups may well merge

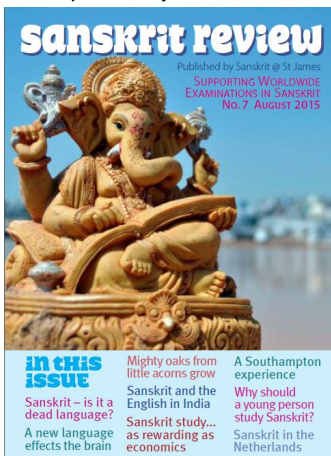

Malta: The place for Sanskrit Study!

Year 11 Sanskritists from St James School went for a Sanskrit study holiday in Malta in February. They stayed in a charming hotel overlooking the sea, studied in the mornings, and went on trips around Malta in the afternoons, particularly concentrating on the ancient temples of Malta, which are unique in the world.

The pupils voted as to which Sanskrit verse should be studied in depth.

Bhagavad Gita 18.54 was chosen. This verse can be translated as:

'Being Absolute, with serene Self, one does not grieve or desire.'

'Being the same in all beings, one finds supreme devotion to the Absolute.'



On each of the five mornings of the week they studied a particular part of this verse and on the last day each pupil reported back on what had been significant for them. In different ways all said they had been touched by both the deep spirituality found in Malta, and the deep spirituality found in the Bhagavad Gita verse which they had been studying.
